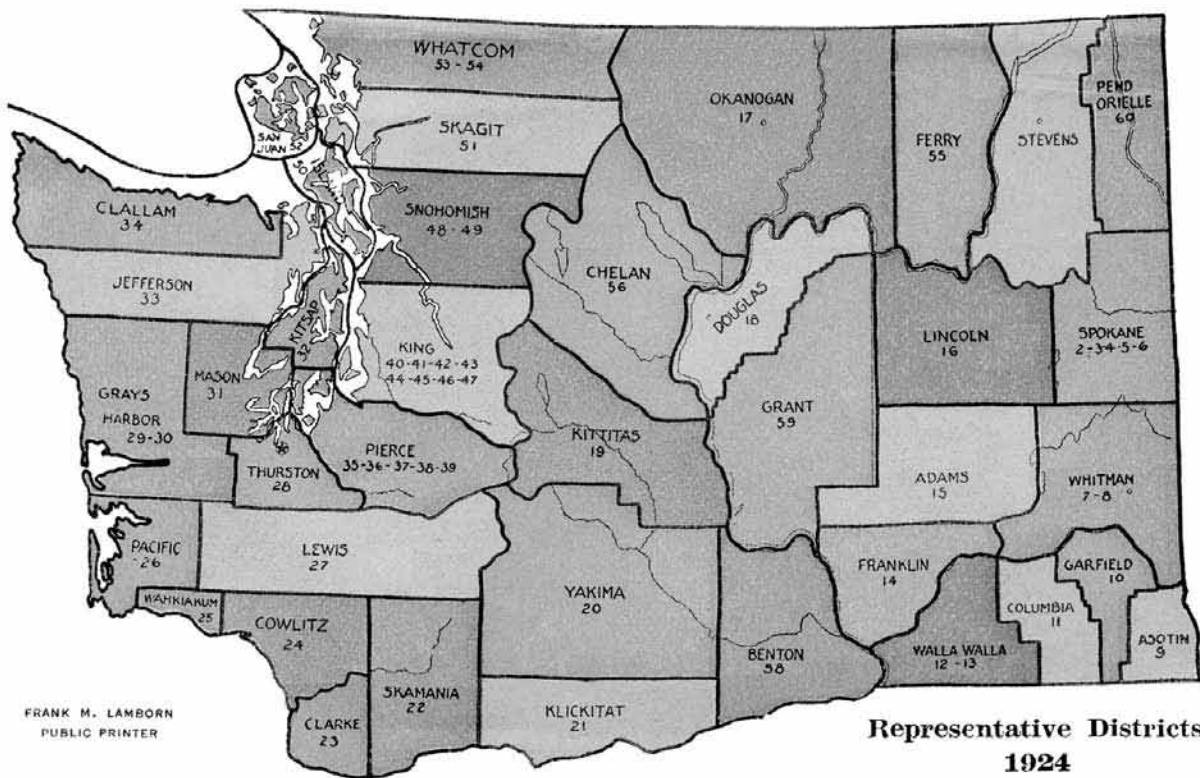

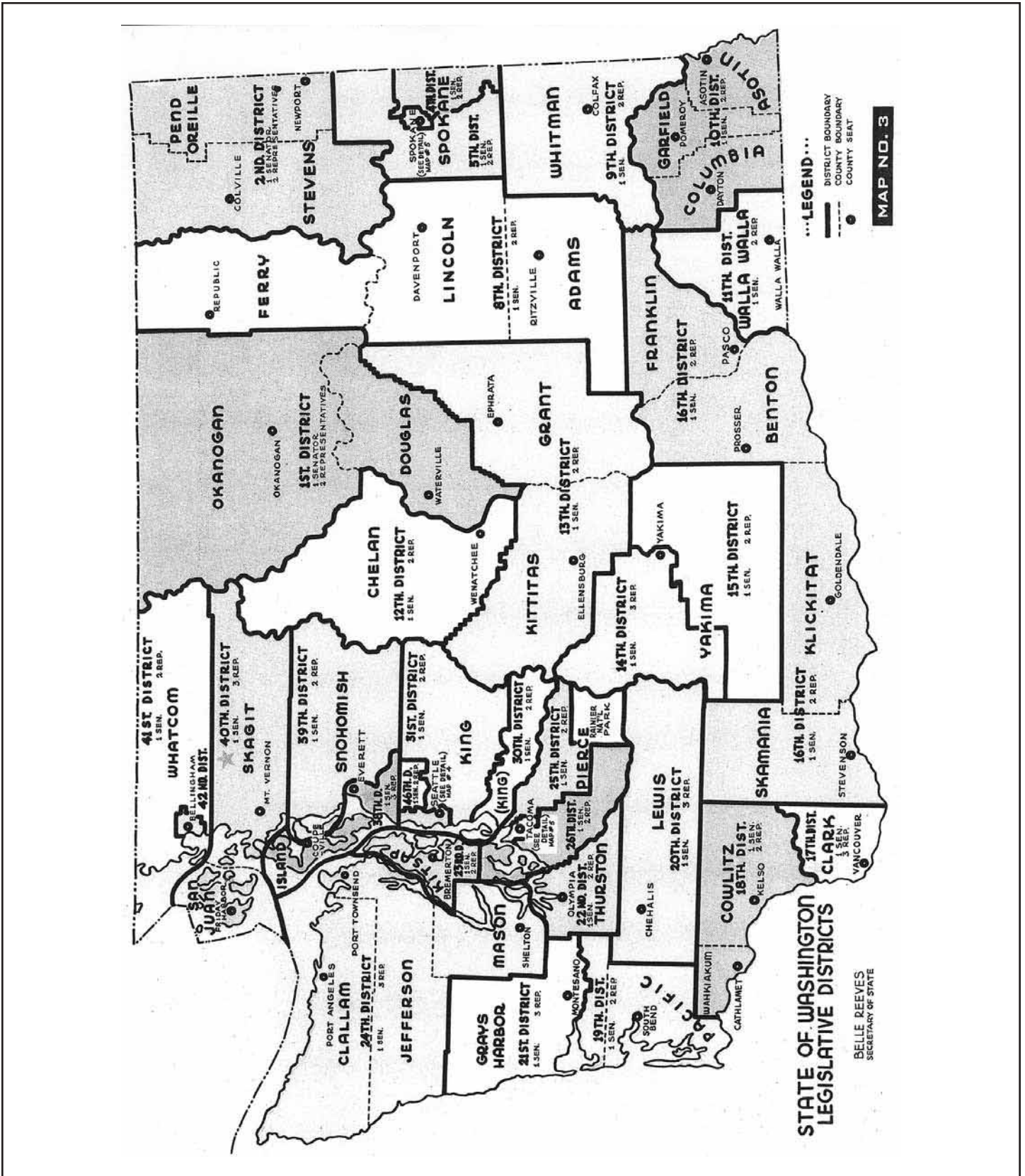

# WASHINGTON STATE LEGISLATIVE DISTRICTS – from statehood until 1931

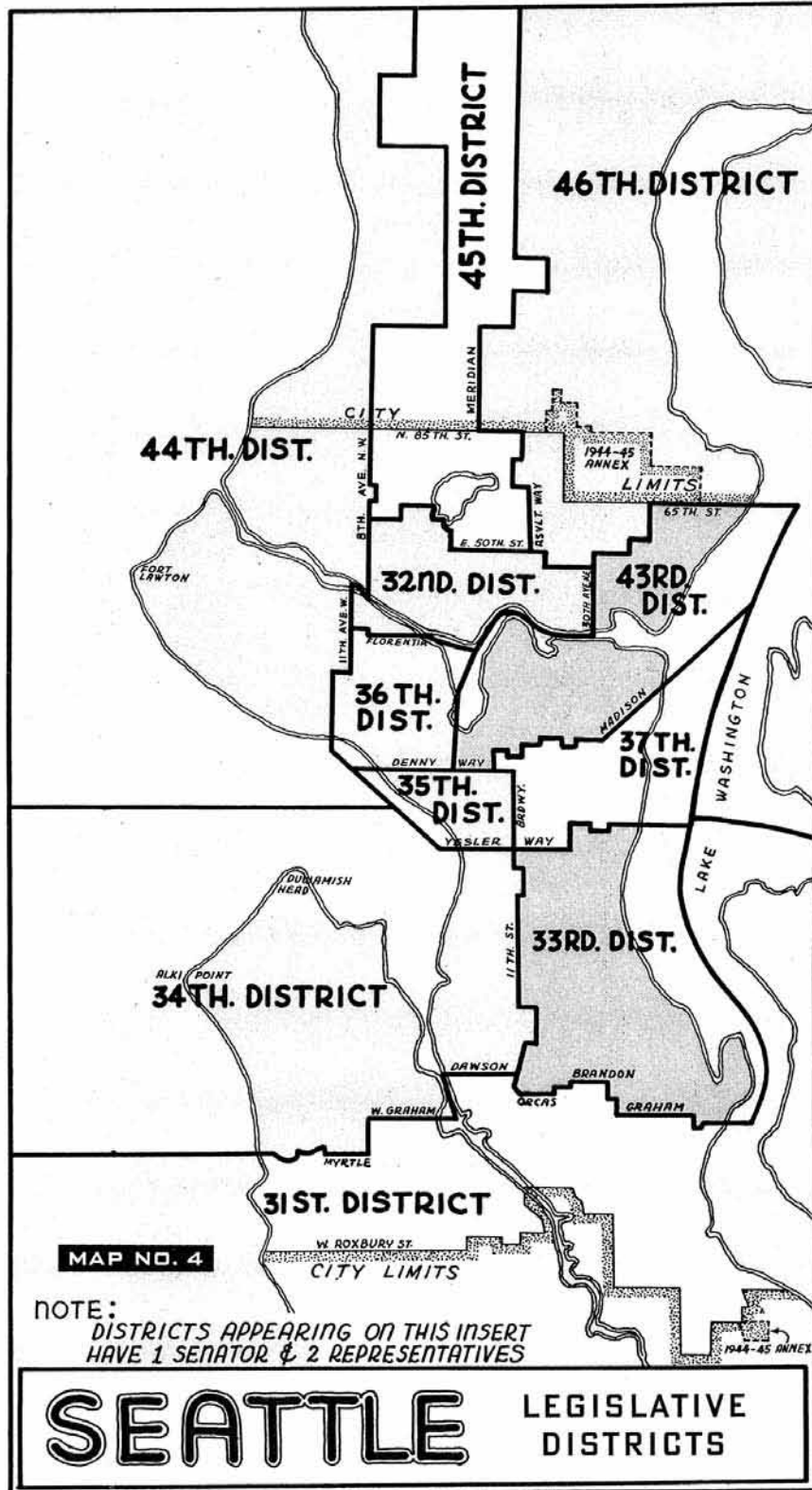


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# WASHINGTON STATE LEGISLATIVE DISTRICTS - 1931 to 1957 (with exception of minor boundary change in 1933)

## The History of Women in the Washington State Legislature

In **1854** as Washington Territory was being formed, the Territorial Convention nearly granted women the right to vote, but the women's suffrage proposal was defeated by a single vote. In 1881, the Territorial House passed legislation granting women the right to vote, but it failed in the Council on a 5 to 7 vote. The issue was debated every session thereafter. The constant protesting and pushing by the Washington Equal Suffrage Association, organized by Susan B. Anthony and Abigail Scott Duniway in 1871, led the Territorial Legislature to grant full voting rights to women in **1883**. But in 1887, the Territorial Supreme Court overturned that law. Another law was enacted in 1888, but that was also quickly overturned. The efforts of women voters opposing the sale of liquor led others to fight to remove their voting rights. The State Constitutional Convention of 1889 did not include women's suffrage in its constitutional proposal to Congress. The questions of voting rights for women, prohibition and siting the state capitol were submitted as separate ballot actions and the male voters disapproved of women's suffrage and prohibition.

In **1910**, voters in Washington approved Amendment 6 to the State Constitution granting women the right to vote. This broke a 14-year gridlock in the national woman suffrage crusade; the state became the fifth in the nation to enfranchise women – the first on the Pacific coast. In **1920**, the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution won the necessary two-thirds ratification from state legislatures and women's suffrage became the law of the land on August 26.

Nationally, the number of female lawmakers in state legislatures steadily climbed after women first entered state office in the 1920s and gained more with the women's movement of the late 1960s and early 1970s, according to research by the Center for American Women and Politics at Rutgers University. In 1998 and 2004, Washington State had the distinction of electing the highest percentage of women to its Statehouse, 40 percent in 1998 and 37 percent in 2004. The state consistently ranks among the top three of all states.

## History of Legislative Meeting Sites

The first legislative session in Washington convened upstairs in the **Parker & Colter Store** above Edmond Sylvester's Gold Bar Restaurant in Olympia between Second and Third Streets on February 28, 1854. The second legislature met in December, 1854, in a colonnaded hall built by the Olympia Lodge 5, Free and Accepted Masons and located at the corner of Capitol Way and Eighth. It was in this **Masonic Temple** that the legislature formally set Olympia as the territorial capital while accepting Edmond Sylvester's, founder of Olympia, donation to the territory of a 12-acre tract on Capitol Hill for use as the capitol site.

On December 1, 1856, the fourth session of the legislature was called to order in its own building. This wooden **Territorial Capitol Building** was located on the present-day capitol campus between the Legislative and Insurance Buildings and would serve as the state capitol for nearly 50 years. The simple two-story wood frame building, 40 feet by 80 feet, was styled like a New England colonial church with a small tower but without a steeple. The Capitol had a portico in front with pillars supporting a balcony above. The House of Representatives met on the second floor, the Council (predecessor to the State Senate) met on the first.

In 1893, foundations for a new State Capitol were laid on the present campus, but the depression halted work and there were no bids on further construction. Still needing a new Capitol to replace their cramped and stuffy quarters, the legislature, in 1901, purchased the Thurston County Courthouse located on Sixth and Washington Streets, which became Washington's second permanent Capitol. The Old Capitol Building, made out of Chuckanut sandstone, is a characteristic example of Nineteenth Century American Romanesque architecture.

An annex to house the legislative chambers was to be completed by the 1903 session. Instead the Old Capitol was not ready and the Secretary of State hastily arranged for the legislature to meet in the Farquhar Store which was located near 7th and Adams Streets. The Territorial Capitol Building on the campus had, by 1903, become uninhabitable. The **Farquhar Building** was built in 1889 as a hardware feed and hay store and covered "1600 square yards." According to newspaper reports, the state spent funds fitting up the building, but legislators called it "The Barn" and their desks referred to as "stalls." The legislators were unhappy although the building was warmer than the old 1856-era capitol and had indoor plumbing. The lighting consisted of "32 candle incandescents hung over the members" and was woefully inadequate.

The 1905 legislative session met in the **Old Capitol Building** which had completed legislative chambers by that date. However the Farquhar Building was pressed into service as a social center for the legislature in 1905 after a fire in 1904 destroyed the elegant Olympia Hotel on Capitol Way and was known as "the Lobby." The Farquhar store was later used as an armory, public hall, skating rink and dance hall. It was razed in 1920.

The Old Capitol Building was dedicated January 11, 1905, before a joint session in the House of Representatives at the inauguration of Governor Albert Mead. Politicians and some observers said it could



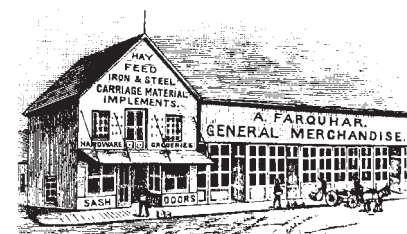

#### Explanatory notes

The information found in this document was gathered from several sources:

California researcher Sally Owen spent several days at the Washington State Library reading through the Journals of both the House and Council, extracting as much information as possible. There were, however, some gaps in this source.

Beginning in August of 1989, Washington/Northwest Room Library Technician Ellen Levesque began a listing of the Territorial Legislators found in an old card file of State Officials. In comparing this information with that compiled by Sally Owen, she was able to fill in several missing pieces of information. Then using Federal Census Indexes for 1860, 1870 and 1880, as well as newspaper accounts and the Washington/Northwest Room biographical index file, many other gaps were filled. Since the original Journals often listed members by initials only, this included finding the whole name of as many members as possible. Unfortunately, it was impossible to find every one.
